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The Martlets Hospice Limited Trustees and Directors present their annual report (including the Strategic Report) for the year ended 31 March 2017 together with the consolidated accounts for the Charity and its subsidiaries.

The accounts comply with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2011, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **Background**

The Martlets Hospice Limited (The Martlets, the Hospice, the Charity, the Company) is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Hospice opened in April 1997 and was formed following the merger of Coppercliff Hospice, The MacMillan Day Hospice Limited and Tarner Home. This report covers the 20th year of operations, for the period April 2016 through to March 2017.

### Objectives of the Charity and Principal Activities and Organisation of our Work

The Martlets is a charity that cares for people living through a terminal illness in and around Brighton and Hove. Most of our patients are cared for in their own home. Our team supports people to live their lives to the full, taking the time to give exceptional, life-changing hospice care. Care also extends to family and friends of patients, bringing comfort, compassion and support when it matters most.

The Charity achieves these objectives by:

- a) providing care which is free at the point of delivery to adults with serious and life-threatening illness;
- b) operating an inpatient unit consisting of 18 beds that provides acute symptom control, continuing care for complex longer-term conditions, respite and end of life care;
- c) operating a service at one's home that takes skilled, hands on, hospice care into the homes of patients;
- d) operating a respite service that supports the carers of patients;
- e) providing a bereavement service for relatives and carers;
- f) providing a range of day services for patients and carers to support their health and wellbeing; and
- g) working in partnership with the NHS, charities and organisations to extend and maximise reach and impact.

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in the planning of future activities.

### Service Provision and Highlights

The Charity continues to provide many services:

#### a) Inpatient Services

In the financial year there were 306 (2015-16, 308) admissions to the inpatient unit. The average length of stay was just over 16 days. A total of 87% of patients had a diagnosis of cancer and the remaining 13% of patients had conditions such as Motor Neurone Disease, Heart Failure and Chronic Respiratory Disease. The complexity of the needs of patients and their families accessing services is increasing and this is most obvious within the inpatient unit, where a greater patient to nurse ratio is required to meet these needs.

#### b) Hospice at Home Services

Our Hospice at Home service provides support for people in their own homes, seven days a week. The Hospice at Home service is part of the wider Palliative Care Partnership which, along with Sussex Community NHS Foundation Trust, provides 24-hour telephone support and advice to patients, families and professionals. The Hospice at Home team saw a total of 333 (2015-16 349) patients for end of life care or respite support, making a total of 3,936 visits (2015-16, 3,885) and 38,792 telephone calls. Such visits supported 168 patients to die at their desired place of death in their homes.

#### c) Patient and Family Support

The Patient and Family Support Team consists of bereavement counsellors, social workers and a chaplain complemented by volunteers. The team supports patients and their families on the inpatient unit while also visiting people in the community, both in their own homes and various care settings. The chaplain and social workers completed 1,535 sessions to family members relating to inpatients; the community visits covered 19 patients with 197 hours of support. The bereavement counsellors and their team of volunteers covered 141 clients (2015-16, 137) attending a total of 703 individual counselling sessions.

#### d) Day Services

Day Services provide supportive care for patients and their carers living at home with a life limiting condition. Services include nursing clinics, art therapy, a range of complementary therapies, legal guidance, mindfulness groups, Tai Chi, reminiscence groups, and a community choir. The service has grown to support 252 patients and carers (2015-16, 230) in this last year, which is a significant increase on last year. The complementary therapies are delivered by a skilled team of 20 volunteers for inpatients and patients visiting for their specific sessions. A new addition in the year has been the "sow and grow" programme. This initiative was delivered by a trained horticulturist therapist and Registered Nurses and has provided patients with a therapeutic social activity that is based on an enjoyment of gardening. The programme received national coverage at the 2016 Hospice UK National Conference.

### e) Rehabilitation

The specialist physiotherapist and specialist occupational therapist, along with a therapy assistant, provide rehabilitation services to patients in the inpatient unit and in the community. Investment in the rehabilitation area has allowed an increase to 480 sessions (2015-16, 161) and this extended to covering 86 patients.

#### f) Welfare Benefits Advice Service

The Charity, in partnership with Age UK, runs a dedicated service helping users to establish what they might be entitled to when facing serious ill health. Practical support includes finding out entitlements, application processes and acting on their behalf for appeals and decisions. Within the year the service received 372 new referrals, a mixture of face to face appointments at the Hospice, home visits and telephone conversations. A total of £1.1m has been claimed on behalf of the service users within the financial year.

### g) Data Analytics

The recruitment of a Data Analytics specialist has led to improvement and evolution in data recording complementing improvements in clinical care. This has enabled us to report and act more efficiently and meaningfully on our services. Such engagement is also assisting in the management of the patient record system, encouraging improvement and efficiencies.

### h) Learning and Development

The Charity has a strong belief that service users should be cared for by health and social care professionals who are well trained and supported. The Learning and Development team provides advice not only to Martlets staff but also to colleagues working in hospitals and the community who support service users at the end of their life. Within the year Martlets has been contracted to provide training courses on end of life care to over 120 Care Homes. This project has and continues to be in partnership with the local Clinical Commissioning Group and Macmillan.

#### i) Information, Communication and Technology (ICT)

The Charity has embarked on a change in strategy moving to a model of partnership with an external Technology provider procured under contract. Specific actions have included the removal of over ten independent servers to two new servers situated in multiple sites. The impact is a unification of capabilities on a single network, improved maintenance and monitoring of fewer devices and improved redundancy capabilities with devices backing up to each other. In addition to the hardware strategy, a new servicing strategy has commenced with the partner providing servicing support to complement in house Charity resources.

### j) Art Sculpture Trail

Between September and December of 2016 the streets of Brighton and Hove were decorated with 44 art sculptures in the shape of Snowdogs. This "Snowdogs by the Sea" trail was led by Martlets in partnership with Wild in Art, a company that specialises in art trails. The trail was an immense success for the Charity. The presentation of such an engaging city-wide event enabled Martlets to use it as a platform to share the understanding of hospice care as life affirming as well as delivering and supporting end of life care. The significant engagement of the public, both locally and from beyond, allowed a dilution of the taboo around hospice care to our many stakeholders, including patients and families.

The art trail allowed the Hospice to interact with existing and new groups in our community, thus developing and cultivating relationships. An example is the fantastic educational programme that created new links with many local schools using the sculptures as a means from which to develop education in both art and hospice care. With the trail being such a success, Martlets will be conducting a second trail in autumn of 2018 for which planning has commenced.

### **Financial Summary**

The statement of financial activities shows an overall surplus for the year of £229k, and a surplus of £435k on unrestricted funds. Total income and the overall surplus have fallen from the 2015-16 level, but that is because 2015-16 included £2.7m of legacy income, an exceptional year. Recorded legacies were £1.4m in 2016-17, close to our ten-year average of £1.6m. The following areas also contributed significantly to the financial results.

#### a) Event Receipts

Event receipts totalled £0.9m, a £0.4m increase over last year's £0.5m. The significant increase has been generated through the art sculpture trail where the closing event concluded in an auction raising over £330k of income for the Charity.

#### b) Lottery

The Hospice lottery changed from £1 per play to £2 per play in April 2016. The lottery has generated a total income of £739k, an increase of £78k on 2015-16. While this result is positive the expectation was to generate more income and efforts will continue in the new financial year to increase this income stream.

#### c) Income from Martlets Trading Company Limited

Martlets Trading Company Limited operates ten charity shops in and around Brighton and Hove. The shops sell goods that have been donated by the public, as well as selling some bought in stock. The purpose of the Trading subsidiary is to generate funds for the Charity to use to further its charitable causes. Where donors have made Gift Aid declarations, the proceeds from the goods they donate are passed through the books of the parent Charity, enabling the Charity to claim the Gift Aid tax relief. During the year, Trading transferred £344k (2015-16, £415k) of income in the form of sales of donated goods where Gift Aid has been applied. This income generated by the network of shops is in addition to the net income from the sales of non-Gift Aid donated goods and bought in goods, which passes through the books of Trading. The results of Trading are summarised in Note 16 of the accounts and show turnover (excluding proceeds of Gift Aided donated goods) of £1,955k (2015-16 £1,788k) and a net loss before transfers to the Charity of £169k (2015-16, net profit of £42k). Together with the proceeds of the Gift Aided donated goods, Trading and the charity shops have contributed to the Charity's funds of £174k (2015-16, £457k). The result for 2016-17 includes the costs of a restructuring of the retail division aimed at equipping the Trading subsidiary for growth in the future.

Martlets is proud to have won the "Specialist Retail Outlet of the Year" award presented at the Hospice UK Retail Conference 2017. The award was in recognition for an innovative 'pop-up' shop, to complement the "Snowdogs by the Sea" sculpture trail led by the Martlets in partnership with Wild in Art.

#### d) Income from Martlets Care Limited

Martlets Care provides expert care for anyone over 18 who needs support or assistance in the comfort of their own home. Martlets Care donates its profits to The Martlets Hospice so the Charity can use such funds to further its charitable causes. Martlets Care has donated £154k of profit to the Charity, an increase of 41% over prior year. Such profit, and hence donation, has been made possible by an increase of income by 13% to £1.4m. The main driver of growth has been the increase in servicing contracts to private clients.

#### e) Reserves Policy

Martlets reserves policy is to have free reserves equivalent to at least 12 months of The Martlets Hospice Limited's expenditure. Free reserves are unrestricted funds less tangible fixed assets. The purpose of holding this target minimum level of reserves is to give confidence to patients, relatives, staff, suppliers, donors and other interested parties of the Charity that it will be able to provide an uninterrupted level of service. Reserves are necessary to provide that security because the Charity's services are provided free of charge and are dependent on income from donations and legacies which is uncertain from year to year. At 31 March 2017, free reserves were £6.8m, while the Hospice's budgeted expenditure for the new financial year ending March 2018 is £6.4m, so free reserves are above the target minimum level.

#### f) Investment Policy [Delete Section as deleted below]

Martlets investment policy stipulates that free reserves of at least three months' expenditure must be kept in instant access bank accounts, while free reserves balances more than three months' expenditure can be invested to generate further income and capital gains for the Charity. Martlets have appointed appropriately qualified investment advisors, Rathbone Brothers Plc, and have defined investment targets and risk appetite. In the year to 31 March 2017 the portfolio increased by 21.4%, reaching a value of £3m, ahead of the MSCI WMA (Morgan Stanley Capital International, Wealth Management Association) Balanced Benchmark which returned 19.6%, both figures on a total return basis.

#### Governance

### The Structure of the Hospice

Martlets is governed by a Board of Trustees which oversees the parent charitable company, The Martlets Hospice Limited. There are then two subsidiary companies, The Martlets Hospice Trading Co Limited and Martlets Care Limited, both of which have been established to provide income for the Charity and each governed by its own elected Board of Directors. Collectively the legal entities are referred to in the Financial Statements as the Group.

The Board of Trustees has established the following Committees to help ensure appropriate oversight of key operational and strategic areas; all Committees offer advice direct to this Board.

- Clinical Governance: This Committee acts on behalf of the Board to oversee and coordinate all aspects of clinical governance relating to the Hospice care services.
- Finance, Information, Communication and Technology: This Committee's role is to develop key financial and technology related policies, oversee the technologies strategy, and review budgets, forecasts and monthly management accounting reports.
- People Services and Remuneration: The Committee supports the responsibilities for issues of recruitment, retention and management of employees and volunteers.
- Income Generation: Its purpose is the governance of income generating and marketing operations and to provide strategic direction, particularly in relation to the longer-term view, to ensure sustainability.

#### a) Directors and Trustees

All Trustees are Directors of The Martlets Hospice Limited. The Board of Trustees has the power to appoint additional Trustees as it considers appropriate. Trustees serve up to a maximum of three terms of three years each. The exceptions to this are the Treasurer and Secretary. The Board, against the criteria of a skills matrix, appoints new Trustees. Within the financial year five new Trustees have been appointed. The Board meets in person every two months. There are additional 'Board Days' to support strategic planning. In the year the number of Trustees has increased from 12 to 13.

#### b) Trustees' Training

All new Trustees receive a full day's induction and an induction pack. Further training is provided as appropriate to the individual roles of the Trustees. Trustees receive updates and attend information sessions on different aspects of their work as the need arises. Within the financial year the Board has revised and expanded the induction provision for new Trustees, following recommendations from external consultants.

### c) Risk Assessment and Management

Martlets has adopted a widely used risk register template, which is updated monthly and reviewed by the relevant Board Committee on a quarterly basis. Mitigations are created for risks, and a single weighted score is created for each highlighted risk. The Business Continuation Plan documents guidelines in the event of significant service disruption. This plan is under constant review.

### d) Fundraising Standards and Complaints

Until July 2016 Martlets was registered with the Fundraising Standards Board (FRSB) and followed the code of practice, demonstrating that Martlets is committed to adhering to the highest standards of fundraising practice. The FRSB closed in July 2016 at the time of the development of the new Fundraising Regulator and the code transferred to them. Martlets continued to follow the Code of Fundraising practice during the transition to the new regulator. Four complaints were received during the year, all of which were resolved satisfactorily. Martlets has since registered with the new Fundraising Regulator and is committed to adhering to the new standards set by them, including registration with the Fundraising Preference Service which commences in July 2017.

### Resource Management

#### Leadership Team Remuneration

The remuneration of the Leadership Team is evaluated on an annual basis assisted by the Croner Reward Salary Comparisons Report. The People Services and Remuneration Committee considers the proposals from the management team, and submits a recommendation to the Board of Trustees.

#### Volunteers

The Martlets could not deliver its extensive services without the invaluable assistance of over 550 regular volunteers operating over 40 different types of roles. The estimated value of such activities exceeds £1m of equivalent staffing costs.

#### **Future Focus**

The Martlets will continue to focus on the following core strategies:

#### a) Increase our reach

This will entail investing in a volunteer strategy to deliver direct care, optimising capacity within the inpatient unit, investing in the growing of community based services, developing new partnership relationships and widening the supporter base to generate greater income for the sustainability of the Hospice.

b) Communicate our role in the provision of services in supportive, palliative and end of life care Continuing engagement with user involvement groups to seek opinions, investing in public relations and marketing, and optimising the website and social media.

#### c) Maximise our income to enable service development and sustainability

The focus will be on creating an achievable income generation strategy, leveraging collaboration opportunities to reduce costs, introducing new and innovative business ventures, ensuring clarity with donors on the impact of Gift Aid declarations, and securing all available statutory funding.

#### d) Measure impact and outcomes

The intention is to set achievable key performance indicators for all areas of Hospice activity. These will include measuring achievements on a regular basis; adhering to a strict governance framework to safeguard all departments; ensuring productive stakeholder involvement, and formal evaluation of the services delivered.

Following are specific initiatives that fulfil the core strategies in the new financial year:

#### a) Satellite Clinic in Peacehaven

Martlets has been aware of the difficulties presented to existing and potential service users further away from the Hospice site in Hove, notably areas to the east of Brighton. In the summer Martlets will be commencing a satellite clinic in the Peacehaven area utilising community buildings in the area to offer services that might otherwise be conducted in Hove.

#### b) Clinical Effectiveness through the Patient Record System

Martlets Clinical Team will be leading a review, improvement and investment plan of the electronic patient record system. This system is integral to the care offered to service users. Improvements include the ease and efficiency of recording patient information and the enablement of more accurate, detailed and reliable reporting on services.

#### a) Patient Experience

Martlets makes a constant effort to understand the view and feedback from existing and potential service users. An extension to this will be a new patient experience survey, piloted within the inpatient unit and day services.

### b) Retail Operations within Martlets Trading Subsidiary

A detailed and thorough review has been conducted of the operations resulting now in a restructuring of the retail organisation and operations. Restructuring of operations will be concluded by the end of the summer in 2017. A part of the plan is to open a new retail shop in central Brighton.

#### c) Real Estate

The Martlets Hospice was built in 1997 embedded into the Brighton and Hove community and over the years there has been various enhancements made aimed at improving the experience for service users. In Autumn of 2017 a next tranche of work will commence to reconfigure the rear entrance to the building to enhance passage and experience for patients entering the inpatient unit.

There is a recognition that the Martlets needs additional space that could house functions of an administrative nature. The acquisition of such space would alleviate space within the Hospice site that would then allow more dedicated use to clinical services. The Charity is currently assessing options in procuring such real estate.

#### d) Learning and Development and People Services

The Charity has a strong belief that those using our services will be cared for, and supported, by well trained staff and volunteers across all areas of the organisation. Our refreshed offer will focus on key areas:

- a. A new focus on workforce development to drive improvement, coach and empower our teams, good performance management and succession planning.
- b. Development of strong attraction and retention offer with clear career pathways.
- c. Development of our external training offer to extend our reach and build our reputation.

Our wider People Services team will be focusing on service improvement and coaching managers, whilst recruiting staff and volunteers to fulfil our commitments to patient care.

#### Respective responsibilities of Trustees and auditors

As explained more fully in the statement of Trustees' responsibilities, the Trustees, who are also the Directors of The Martlets Hospice Limited for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

We have been appointed under the Companies Act 2006 and report in accordance with that act.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the accounts in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors.

#### Scope of the audit of the accounts

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the accounts sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the accounts are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Charitable Company's and Group's circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the Trustees; and the overall presentation of the accounts.

#### 1.0 Statutory information

The Martlets Hospice Limited is a charitable company, limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The Charitable Company's registered number and registered office address can be found in the Legal and Administrative Information section of the accounts.

#### 2.0 Accounting policies

#### 2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, effective 1 January 2015, (Charities SORP, FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The Martlets Hospice Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s). There are no material uncertainties about The Martlets Hospice Limited's ability to continue as a going concern.

#### 2.2 Group financial statements

The financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly-owned subsidiaries, Martlets Care Limited and The Martlets Trading Co Limited, on a line by line basis. A separate Statement of Financial Activities and Income and Expenditure Account for the Charity has not been presented as the Charity has taken advantage of the exemption afforded by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

#### 2.3 Income

All income is accounted for in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the Charity is legally entitled to the income, receipt is probable and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Income from donations is accounted for as received by the Charity. The income from fund-raising ventures is shown gross, with the associated costs included in fund-raising costs. The value of voluntary work is not included in the financial statements.

Grants are recognised in full in the SOFA in the year in which they are receivable. Grants for the purchase of fixed assets are credited to restricted income when they are receivable. Where the use of the asset is restricted, depreciation is charged against the restricted fund. Where the use of the asset is not restricted it is transferred to the general fund.

Other income, including investment income and commissions, is recorded on an accruals basis.

For legacies, entitlement is taken on a case by case basis as the earlier of the date on which the Charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Charity that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the Charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. If the legacy is in the form of an asset other than cash or an asset listed on a recognised stock exchange, recognition is subject to the value of the asset being able to be reliably measured and title to the asset has passed to the charity. Where legacies have been notified to the Charity or the Charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is a treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material (see Note 28).

Gifts in kind are valued at market value and are included in donations.

#### 2.4 Expenditure

Costs are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis inclusive of irrecoverable VAT. All costs are allocated between expenditure categories and departments on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource.

Fund raising expenditure comprises costs incurred in inducing people and organisations to contribute financially to the Charity's work. This includes the cost of advertising for donations and the staging of special events.

Where possible, costs have been allocated directly to the activity to which they relate. However, there are also shared support costs that enable the Group's charitable income generating and administrative activities to be undertaken. These costs have been allocated to the Group's activities using appropriate cost drivers as follows:

- staff numbers for administration, human resources, information management and facilities costs;
- floor area for maintenance costs; and
- direct costs for finance charges.

#### 2.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Leasehold buildings 2% reducing balance
Furniture & equipment 15-20% reducing balance
Motor vehicles 25% reducing balance
Computer equipment 25-30% straight line

Assets costing less than £5,000 are written off to the Statement of Financial Activities. Assets under construction are not depreciated until the asset is brought into use.

#### 2.6 Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are capitalised in the balance sheet and depreciated over their expected useful lives. The interest element of leasing payments represents a constant proportion of the outstanding capital.

All other leases are regarded as operating leases and the payments made under them are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

### 2.7 Investments

Investments are stated at fair value. Realised and unrealised gains and losses on investments are dealt with in the Statement of Financial Activities. Investment income plus associated tax recoverable is credited to income on an accruals basis, using dates of payment for dividends, and daily accrual for interest. Capital and cash accounts held within investment portfolios are included on the Balance Sheet within 'Cash at bank and in hand'.

Investment property is stated at fair value. The fair value has been determined by a valuation conducted by an independent, appropriately qualified individual.

### 2.8 Stock

Stock represents unused medical supplies and trading stock at the balance sheet date. Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow-moving items.

#### 2.9 Donated goods and services

Donated goods and services have not been recognised in these financial statements as it is not practicable to do so as the cost outweighs the benefit.

#### 2.10 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due.

#### 2.11 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments. The Trustees seek to use short and medium term deposits where possible to maximise the return on monies held at the bank and to manage cash flow

#### 2.12 Financial instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

#### 2.13 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the Charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

#### 2.14 Pension costs

The Charity operates a defined benefit pension scheme and a defined contribution pension scheme for its staff. The costs charged in the financial statements represent the amounts payable to the schemes for the accounting period.

The Charity is one of a number of employers in the National Health Service Pension Scheme. It is, therefore, not possible to allocate any actuarial surplus or deficit and, consequently, contributions to the National Health Service Pension Scheme are charged to the SOFA in the year in which they fall due for payment. The scheme has both defined benefits and contributions, any shortfall in the national fund being met by the Exchequer.

The Charity is one of a number of employees contributing to the Federated Flexiplan No1 Pension Scheme. This is a multi-employer scheme where the assets and liabilities of the scheme applicable to each employer are not separately identifiable. Therefore, the pension charge recorded in these accounts is the amount of contributions payable on a defined contribution basis in the accounting year in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102.

#### 2.15 Accumulated funds

Funds held by the Charity are either:

Unrestricted general funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees.

Restricted funds – Donations, bequests or incoming resources for which the donor has earmarked for a specific purpose are treated as restricted funds. These funds may be income only (where the capital must be retained) or income and capital (where the donation and income there from may be utilised).

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### 2.16 Taxation

The Charitable Company is registered as a charity and all of its income falls within the exemptions under Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010.

#### Hospice Development Fund

This asset fund represents the Hospice building. It appears as a restricted fund because the original capital appeal to build the Hospice was conducted by MacMillan Cancer Support. On completion, the asset was then given to the Charity with the restriction that it was to be used only as a hospice. The expenditure shown during the year represents depreciation and rent paid to the NHS who owns the land. The Hospice building is also represented in our fixed asset schedule.

#### Hospice Running Costs

This cash fund represents the income and expenditure of restricted grants and donations made during the year for equipment and care costs.

#### Refreshing Spaces

A capital grant was provided by the Department of Health in 2011 to refurbish our inpatient unit and to build a new spiritual space and patient activity room. Additional sums were raised from private individuals. The outgoing resources represent depreciation on capital assets forming part of the appeal.

#### Gateways to Care Spaces

A capital grant was provided by the Department of Health in 2008 to refurbish our reception and day hospice facilities. The outgoing resources represent depreciation on capital assets forming part of the appeal.

#### The Thompson Fund Training Endowment

This is a cash endowment fund built with donations from The Thompson Fund during 2006 and 2007. It is restricted to supporting training activities at the Hospice. The endowment is being utilised over a 12-year period to support the training requirements of the Hospice.

### 22 Restricted Funds (continued)

#### The Cooper Training Fund

This cash fund represents the income and expenditure of restricted donations made during the year for training purposes.

#### Hospice @ Home

This cash fund represents our Hospice @ Home service and shows the income and expenditure of restricted grants and donations in the year. This fund includes a £3,000 grant awarded by the February Foundation which was fully spent by the year end.

#### Specific Donations

This cash fund represents the income and expenditure of restricted donations made during the year for staff entertainment and benefits.

#### Renaissance Project

A capital grant was provided by NHS England in 2013 to create new day service facilities including a café and three multi-functional rooms. Improvements were also made to our main entrance and drugs room. Additional sums were raised from charitable trusts. The expenditure in the year represents depreciation on capital assets forming part of the appeal.

#### Syringe Driver Servicing

This fund represents monies advanced from the February Foundation which was utilised to assist in the costs of servicing syringe drivers at the Hospice.

#### **Equipment**

This cash fund represents the income and expenditure of restricted income received to fund purchases of equipment.

#### Choir

This cash fund represents the income and expenditure of restricted donations made during the year towards the running costs of the Hospice choir.

### Other

This cash fund represents the income and expenditure of restricted donations made during the year for other purposes.

#### 25 Pension Schemes

The group operates four pension schemes for its employees, two defined contribution schemes administered by Friends Provident and Scottish Life, a Federated Flexiplan scheme and the NHS Superannuation Scheme.

### Friends Life

This is a defined contribution scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the Group in a fund independently administered by Friends Life and the assets and liabilities of the scheme are therefore not represented in the Group accounts.

#### Scottish Life

This is a defined contribution scheme. The assets of the scheme ae held separately from those of the Group in a fund independently administered by Scottish Life and the assets and liabilities of the scheme are therefore not represented in the Group accounts.

#### NHS Superannuation Scheme

The Group makes contributions to the NHS Superannuation Scheme for nursing and medical staff. The NHS Superannuation Scheme is an approved multi-employer scheme and, as such, the Group is not able to identify its share of the assets or of the potential liability it may have to the scheme at the balance sheet date.

#### Federated Flexiplan Scheme

The Federated Flexiplan No 1 ("the Plan") is a defined benefit scheme. However, because of the non-associated multi-employer nature of the Plan the Group is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the Plan on a consistent and reliable basis and therefore it has been accounted for as a defined contribution scheme.

#### 25 Pension Schemes (continued)

The Plan closed to further accrual in January 2010 and following Court hearings for interpretation of the Plan rules, the entitlement of members has been definitively established. An actuarial valuation at 31 March 2009 revealed a significant deficit and a consequent recovery plan required the Group to contribute in respect of its share of the deficit. The basis used to calculate the deficit was chosen to produce a level for the liabilities which was anticipated to be broadly in line with the cost of securing the Plan benefits with an insurer. A further valuation was conducted at 31 March 2012 which indicated that the overall deficit at that date was £17.6 million. More recently, a valuation at 31 March 2015 indicated that the deficit stood at £4.9 million which resulted in a revised recovery plan with repayment requirements at £47,126 per annum until 31 March 2017 and £29,399 per annum from 1 April 2017. However, the scheme actuary has now certified that no further contributions are required to be made in the two years to March 2019 as a result of the scheme trustee entering a buy in covering the scheme liabilities with an insurer in February 2017. No further contributions are anticipated in respect of this scheme.

#### 27 Related Party Transactions

Legal services were provided by Dean Wilson LLP of which Mr I Wilson, a Trustee of the Charity, was a partner throughout the year. The value of services provided to the Charity amounted to £9,270 (2016: £8,232) and were carried out on normal commercial terms. An amount of £nil (2016: £nil) remained unpaid at the year end.

During the year purchases amounting to £12,390 (2016: £1,522) were made from Mosaic Brighton Limited, a company in which the partner of the Chief Executive is a shareholder, on discounted commercial terms. An amount of £nil (2016: £900) remained unpaid at the year end.

Mr D Waters (a former director of The Martlets Trading Co Limited) had a material interest in Howden Group (previously known as The Care Home Insurance Service) until 29 February 2016. During the year to March 2016 the group were invoiced £17,242 by the company. The services were provided on normal commercial terms.

## 28 Contingent Assets

#### Legacy Income

As at 31 March 2017 the Charity had been notified of residuary legacies where the value of these estates was uncertain as the executors were not able to compile the estate accounts as a result of potential outstanding claims on the estates. No amount has been accrued in respect of these legacies.

#### Legal Claim

At the 2016 balance sheet date the Charity was formulating a potential legal claim concerning building works not fit for purpose at the front entrance of the Hospice. This claim has now been settled in the Charity's favour.
